

Football: Allison discusses progress following first week in pads

Union County football to host its annual Meet the Team event at 6 p.m. Friday

Union County football was back in full pads last week for the first time since the spring scrimmage at Chestatee.

The Panthers didn't see much live action right away, but that changed Monday as the scrimmage game is less than two weeks away.

The last week in July saw the players take part in a mandatory one week conditioning period before putting on the pads in August.

Prior to the first day of school, practice was held in the mornings but with class back in session, the Panthers will be on the field every day at 3:30.

This Friday will offer a bit of a reprieve, however, as the annual Meet the Team event will be held at Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium at 6 p.m.

The Meet the Team is an opportunity for the community to visit with this year's football team and cheerleading squad. Each of the players and coaches will be on hand for pictures, autographs, or to just say hello and wish them luck on the upcoming season.

A week from Thursday, on Aug. 17, Union County will host Rabun Gap for a scrimmage at 7 p.m. The regular season will get underway on Friday, Aug. 25 at Gilmer County.

With the season less than three weeks away, Panthers Head Coach Brian Allison provided the *North Georgia News* with an update on the first week of practice.

NGN: What was the focus of the first week in full pads. What were you looking to accomplish?

BA: We're just working on the fundamentals, like blocking and tackling before we get heavy into the live situations (this week).

NGN: Entering the spring, two areas of concern were the offensive line and the secondary. Have you been able to get a better look at those positions?

BA: We've gotten a pretty good look at some of those areas but I'm not solid on all of those positions as of yet. I'm pretty comfortable with most of the positions but there's still a few that are up for grabs.

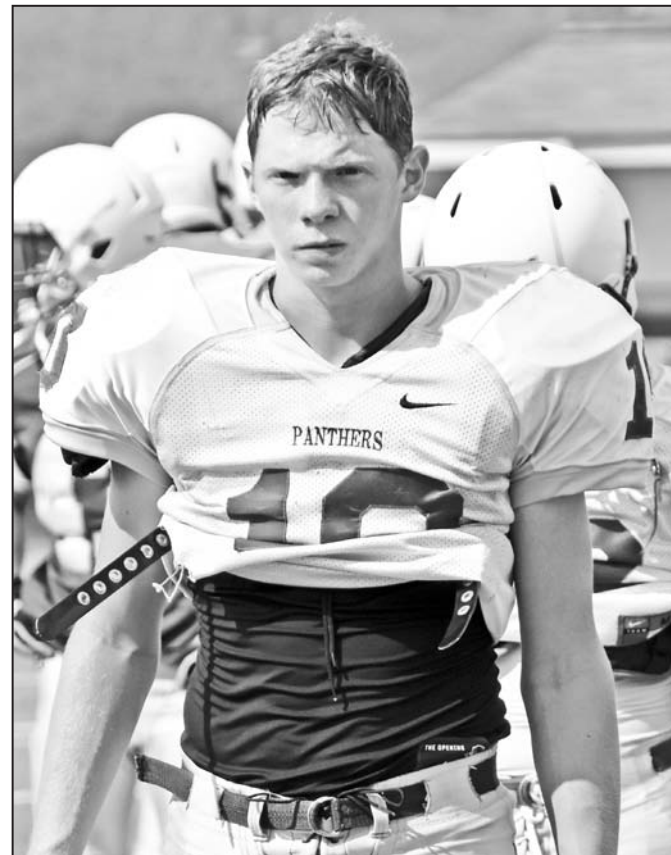
NGN: Will anything change, practice-wise, now

that school is underway and you're practicing in the afternoons?

BA: Putting on pads adds a little bit of time onto when we can get started but I feel pretty good with where we're at. Last year at this point, we were breaking in a new quarterback so that cre-

ated a little bit of a panic but I feel pretty comfortable with where we are at this point, especially compared to last year.

NGN: Has everyone stayed healthy after returning to pads and full contact? Are we dealing with any injuries after week one?

BA: We don't have any major injuries but we've got three (defensive backs) who were out last week. Two are out with hamstring pulls and (Sean Dobbins) is dealing with a shoulder issue. He's had a good summer but we just need to get him healthy so he can get back in and start

getting some reps. By missing preseason practice, they are all missing out on some valuable work, but I'd rather play it safe and hold them out so they can return for the scrimmage or the first game. At this point we're not expecting anyone to miss any significant (regular season) time.
