

## Panthers' upset bid denied in 26-12 loss at No. 5 Rockmart

Rockmart - Union County (1-3, 1-1) gave No. 5 Rockmart all it could handle in a 26-12 region loss. Despite the Panthers' valiant effort, they ultimately gifted the Yellow Jackets 16 points courtesy of two botched punts, an interception and a turnover on downs.

The miscues netted Rockmart average starting field position at Union's 46yard line, but stellar defensive play kept the visitors in the game until the final minutes.

"Coach (Mark) Wade and our defensive staff did a great job and our defense played their hearts out," Union County head coach Michael Perry said. "Our offense made a lot of critical mistakes, and if they did what they were coached to do, the result would have probably ended up a lot better.

Union County grabbed an early 6-0 edge and maintained possession throughout the first quarter after Rockmart couldn't corral a squib kick, recovered by Union, following the opening drive score.

Rockmart used a touchdown and a field goal to inch ahead 9-6 at the break before extending the lead to 16-6 after three.

Freshman Kamden Kendrick's second touchdown pass moved Union within 16-12 early in the fourth, but Rockmart turned an interception into 3 points and then tacked on a late touchdown run to secure the win.

Kendrick finished with a career-high 245 yards on 24 of 37, including 2 TDs and a pair of interceptions. Senior Maddox Young had 13 grabs for 88 yards and a score; junior Tyler

85 yards and a touchdown.

kicker penalty breathed new life into Union's opening series, Young capped off Union's reception over the middle on fourth and 10. The Panthers' PAT attempt failed on a mishandled snap.

Smith's squib kick deflected off a Rockmart player, allowing Braden Plott to pounce on the loose ball, awarding Union possession at the Jackets' 47.

A Union penalty before the PAT brought the Jackets' offense back on the field to attempt a shortened 2-point conversion, but a botched snap kept the score tied at 6-6.

A blocked punt following a Union three-and-out handed Rockmart a short field at the 29, where the Union defense tightened up and limited the home team to a 37-yard field goal.

drive stalled at the Jackets' 34 coming at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, with a minute to play in the half before the defense forced three Rockmart incompletions on four attempts, keeping the score at 9-6 going to the break. Both offenses punted to begin the third quarter, but a bad snap on Union's try awarded the Jackets' optimal field position at the 9-yard line. Two plays later, Rockmart put it in the endzone to mount a 16-6 advantage. The Panthers' next drive ended with a questionable interception, that appeared to hit the turf, but the defense delivered again with a fourth down stop at the 37-yard line. Three plays later, Kendrick went up top to Parker on a 52yard scoring strike that saw the junior receiver pull down a tipped pass behind the secondary and take it to the house, moving Union within 16-12 at the 9:43 mark of the fourth.

Union responded by driving inside the Rockmart 15, courtesy of three timely catches from Young. However, the upset bid was put to bed when Kendrick was picked off at the goal line near the 2-minute mark.

Senior Connor Schuknecht rushed 14 times for 56 yards and added 2 receptions for 27 yards; sophomore Chetley Cox caught 2 passes for 38 yards; sophomore Robert Thompson had one grab for 7 yards.

Seniors Ethan Lester and Kaden Combs led the defense at 13 tackles each with Combs adding a TFL. Sophomore Alan Godinez, senior Darin Patterson and freshman Micah Wallace chipped in 6 tackles apiece

"I'm really proud of Ethan Lester, Boomer (Combs), Plott, (Jaxon) Totherow and (Easton) Shumaker," Perry said.

Sept. 20. The annual Meet the Panthers event is scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 19 at 5:30 p.m. North Murray enters

Friday with a 3-1 record and a 2-0 mark in Region 7-AA. The Mountaineers handed rival Murray County a 40-14 loss last week despite trailing 7-6 after one and nursing a 14-7 halftime edge.

North Murray, a run-first offense, is led by junior quarterback Hudson Hulett who averages 170 yards rushing per game.

"They want to run the ball," Perry said regarding North Murray. "Their previous quarterback transferred to another school so they put their best athlete back there at quarterback and let him run. We need to be ready to play."

Thursday's JV game at Dawson County has been moved to Tuesday at 5:30 due to the Meet the Panthers event.

In injury news, Coach Perry expects freshman wide receiver Mikey Davis to be healthy for North Murray after missing the Rockmart game.

"He'll be back this week," Perry said. "We definitely need him "


